In-text citation - 3 options:

- **Blah blah blah blah blah blah (Author number).**
- **According to Author blah blah blah blah (number).**
- **“Blah blah blah blah blah blah,” said Author (number).**

Where “number” is the page number or paragraph number, if applicable. If no Author, then use Title, e.g., **Blah blah blah (“Title”).**

Citations in the **Works Cited** list should include these **elements** in this order (where applicable)

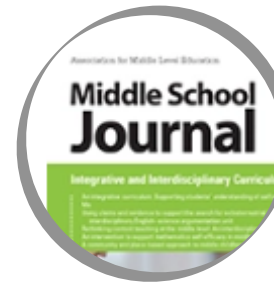

CONTAINER

1 Author.	Who created the work?
2 Title of Source.	What is the name of the work?
3 Title of Container,	Larger wholes in which the source is located
4 Other Contributors,	Editors, illustrators, translators, etc
5 Version,	Edition or version of a work
6 Number,	Part of sequence, volume and/or issue
7 Publisher,	Who produced or distributed the work?
8 Publication Date,	When was it created?
9 Location.	Where found? Page / paragraph number, URL or DOI
& IBO Access Date.	When found? Important if source may change.
